"What's Love Got To Do With It?"

Points from Sunday's Message

- 1. We should respond to God's gift of salvation by living in connection with Him.
- 2. The depth of our relationship with God is proven by how we connect with His people.
- 3. A sanctified life focused on eternity connects with the world and makes disciples.

Key Verse:

"Abide in Me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, unless it abides in the vine, neither can you, unless you abide in Me. I am the vine, you are the branches. He who abides in Me, and I in him, bears much fruit; for without Me you can do nothing."

— John 15:4-5

Discussion Questions:

- 1. What does it mean to you personally that "for us and our salvation, He came down"?
 - How does understanding God's intentional plan from Genesis 3:15 change how you see the story of Jesus?
- 2. Pastor Mark compared God "getting off the couch" not to punish, but to take the punishment. How does this image reshape how we view God's love and justice?
- 3. In what ways have you seen God rescue you "out of the septic tank," as Pastor Mark shared in his childhood story?
 - What testimony of God's grace in your life can you share with someone else this week?

- 4. Pastor Mark said the appropriate response to the gift of salvation is to abide in Christ. What does "abiding" look like in your daily life?
 - Read John 15:4–5. What does fruit-bearing mean for you personally?
- 5. How does connecting with God's people (the church) deepen your relationship with God?
 - Are you more of a "spectator" or a "participant" in the church body right now? What is one step you could take toward deeper community involvement?
- 6. Pastor Mark shared vulnerably about suffering and how God meets us there. How have you seen God work through suffering—either your own or someone else's—for His glory and others' comfort?
 - Read 2 Corinthians 1:3–4. How might your pain become a platform to care for others?

Use these blended questions for deeper personal reflection, prayer, or small group discussion.
