Points from Sunday's Message

- 1. Jesus intends to call, choose, name, and appoint individuals unto His mission.
- 2. The mission of Jesus is accomplished by those who show up.
- 3. Jesus has a task and purpose for everyone who shows up.
- 4. Jesus prepares, equips, and empowers those He appoints.

Key Verse:

And when it was day, He called His disciples to Himself; and from them He chose twelve whom He also named apostles:

Luke 6:13

Discussion Questions:

Reflect:

Jesus spent all night in prayer before calling and appointing His twelve apostles (Luke 6:12–13).

- What does this tell us about Jesus' priorities and dependence on the Father?
- How might this challenge or reshape the way we make important decisions?

Connect:

In the message we heard that discipleship is a progression — from seeker, to hearer, to follower, to learner, to messenger, to witness.

- Where do you see this progression illustrated in the Gospels?
- What stage do you think most people in our culture tend to stall at, and why?

Consider:

Paul could confidently say, "Imitate me, just as I also imitate Christ."

- Who are the people in your life whose example has helped shape your walk with Jesus?
- · What made their lives worth imitating?

Apply:

Self-Assessment:

Where would you place yourself in the seeker-to-sent journey right now?

What would it look like for you to take one step further in following Jesus this week?

Availability over Ability:

The message emphasized: "Ministry isn't about extraordinary ability, but consistent availability."

What are some practical ways you can "show up and keep showing up" in your home, church, or community this season?

Witness and Cost:

The Greek word martys means witness — sometimes that witness costs everything.

What does faithful witness look like in our modern context?

What might it cost you personally to be a consistent, public follower of Jesus — and what promise makes that cost worth it?

Use these blended questions for deeper personal reflection, prayer, or small group discussion.
